Life of David

A Man After God's Own Heart

Keilah Delivered

- David is notified that the threshing floors at Keilah are being plundered by the Philistines [1 Sam 23:1].
 - O A threshing floor is a large, flat, round surface where grain is threshed to separate the chaff.
 - O Keilah was a fortified city in the south toward Edom allotted to Judah [Josh 15:21 ... 44] and reoccupied in Nehemiah's time [Neh 3:17-18].
- David inquired of the Lord regarding His will concerning the Philistines [1 Sam 23:2].
 - O David wanted to know if he should attack (נְכָה), nacah = strike, smite) the Philistines.
 - O The Lord responded to David telling him to attack the Philistines with the result that he would deliver (שָׁיָ yasha' = save, deliver) Keilah.
- David's men told him they were afraid, so he inquired of the Lord again [1 Sam 23:3-4].
 - O David inquired a second time on behalf of his men, not because he doubted the Lord.
 - O The Lord assured David that he would bring about the victory over the Philistines and instructed him to arise and go to Keilah.
- Just as the Lord had promised, David was granted victory over the Philistines and delivered Keilah [1 Sam 23:5].
- Amilelech's son Abiathar, having escaped from Saul's massacre, came down to David at Keilah with the priest's ephod in hand [1 Sam 23:6].
- Saul learned of David's whereabouts and summoned his men to go down and kill David and his men [1 Sam 23:7-8].
 - O In his carnality, Saul convinced himself that his sinful desire was the will of God.
 - O Saul was familiar with the fortifications at Keilah and believed he would use them to defeat David.
- David heard that Saul was up to no good, so he inquired of the Lord, this time using Abiathar's ephod [1 Sam 23:9-12].
 - O David had previously successfully inquired of the Lord which shows us that the priest's ephod was not necessary to make inquiry of God.
 - O The Lord confirmed that Saul was coming down after David and would attack the city of Keilah.
 - O The Lord also confirmed that, under the threat of attack, the men of Keilah would surrender David and his men to Saul.
 - O This is interesting given that David and his men had just delivered Keilah from the Philistines.
 - O As we shall see, David and his men did not remain in Keilah, so the answer the Lord gave David regarding being surrendered never came to pass.
 - O This is an extremely important passage in terms of understanding God's foreknowledge.
 - O God's foreknowledge encompasses way more than just the things that actually occur God is able to foreknow what will happen as well as all of the things that could have happened if the circumstances were different (omniscience).

- David and his men left Keilah and went to the wilderness of Ziph [1 Sam 23:13-14].
 - O At this point David has about 600 men.
 - O When Saul learned that they had left Keilah, he quit pursuing them.
 - O Saul was undeterred, however, and continued to seek David's life in the wilderness.
 - O This unrelenting pursuit is a foreshadowing of Satan's pursuit of Jesus trying to tempt Him in the wilderness [Luke 4:1-13].
 - O The Lord protected David from Saul's pursuits, holding Saul to his own vow [1 Sam 19:6].
